Did you know...

Schoharie County Community Action Program, Inc. (SCCAP) has been providing services to the residents of Schoharie County for 59 years!

On August 20th, 1964 President Lyndon Johnson signed the Economic Opportunity Act, which created a variety of programs, including Community Action Agencies, as part of his War on Poverty. He knew then, as we know now, that the war against poverty must be won in the field, in every private home, in every public office, from the courthouse to the White House.

SCCAP was established in 1965 to wage the war on poverty in Schoharie County, New York by promoting self-sufficiency for those of limited income, ensuring that all residents are able to live in dignity; by implementing innovative and cost-effective programs to improve the lives and living conditions of the impoverished; by providing support and instruction for everyone in need of assistance; and by being a major voice of reason in establishing welfare system reforms.

SCCAP, as a recipient of Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) federal funds, is also charged with utilizing a performance measurement system to ensure the needs of Schoharie County's economically challenged families are being met to the best of our ability through the delivery of SCCAP's programs and services. To meet this expectation, SCCAP uses the performance-based management tool known in short as ROMA. Results Oriented Management and Accountability (ROMA) is the standard used by Community Action Agencies (CAA) throughout the United States to guide and evaluate CAA effectiveness. There are currently over 1,000 CAAs in the United States!

Why ROMA? Because it

- Assesses poverty needs and conditions within a community
- Defines a clear anti-poverty mission
- Looks at strategies and services to address needs—both immediate and long term, and
- Guides the implementation of programs, services, and strategies within the agency and among partnering organizations to provide meaningful impacts to the families served.

The 2023 Impact Report provides an overview of just some of the services and their benefits to our community.







Stabilizing Families & Maximizing Resources



The first step in the pathway to self-sufficiency is stabilization; meeting immediate needs to alleviate stressors and keep families safe. Access to supplemental programs help families maximize their financial resources.

22 rent/utility payments to keep families housed
373 pantry packages | 253 HEAP applications

Increased disposable income through the Earned Income Tax Credit

Did you know? The Earned Income Tax Credit works to reduce the poverty rate and increase quality of life by helping individuals offset their tax expenses retain more of their earned income—for saving or local spending!

Stabilization Impact:

The Community Service Department received a call from a client in need of housing assistance. The client was an older woman who had been homeless for almost 2 years. She had been staying in a local motel since August of 2022. DSS was paying for her stay but was about to move her to a woman's shelter. She was in a dire situation. With the help of OFA, Catholic Charities, and SCCAP she was able to secure an apartment and no longer need DSS assistance. After 2 very long years she finally had a place to call home!

Supporting Relationships & Esteem-Building

Empowering families is at the center of our mission, and we do this through **strengthening family bonds** and **making community connections**.

124 families participated in skill building
 30 child care connections | 554 family visits occurred
 42 families connected with esteem-building activities for youth



Supporting youth activities, family bonds, skill building, and child care connections strengthens families at home <u>AND</u> increases positive interactions in the community. **Esteem-building** activities prepare youth for success. Child care connections and family visits outside of traditional working hours help to support working parents.

Did you know? SCCAP's Healthy Families/WIC offers parents guided grocery shopping tours—showing participants the healthy choices they can make with their WIC benefits. Participants also learn how to utilize their eWIC card at checkout, facilitating a positive shopping experience and building confidence!

Positive Partnering:

The NYS Capital District Regional Office conducted an on-site Local Agency Compliance and Self-Assessment (LACASA) visit. It was their 2nd visit this year. It was another successful visit with recommendations how to further enhance our program.

SCCAP is committed to reducing energy costs for low-income families by **improving the energy efficiency** of their homes and **ensuring their health and safety**.





Weatherization services improve Schoharie County housing stock and supports economic growth in our neighborhoods by reducing the impact of energy usage and increasing real estate market value on local homes.

Homeowner personal wealth is also improved with increased home value.

Enhancing our Workforce

Employment is a main driver of socioeconomic status – SCCAP supports both employers and those seeking employment in their job search, employment retention, and professional development.

16 total DHP* services provided during 2024
3 individuals enrolled | 1 entered employment
0 retained employment for 90+ days



Helping individuals **overcome barriers to employment** and supporting local businesses in **workforce development** is a multi-faceted approach to **reducing unemployment** and **contributing to economic growth.** Customized business trainings are offered to our local business community to help **support business operations** and **build human assets**.

DHP Participant Success Story: An unemployed program participant by working with employment services staff was successful in securing a new job as a stocker at an area Walmart store and was pro-moted to a Customer Service Postion within her first 30 days of employment!


